

History of Collections Access

- NYBG has 130 year history of making collections available for scientific study
- Visiting Researcher Program totals over 2000 days per year
- Loan Program 10-15K specimens per year
- Visitation is by appointment, not open to the public
- Tours to school groups and other interested parties

History of Collections Access

- In last 3 decades we have added digital access to collections through the C. V. Starr Virtual Herbarium as well as other data aggregators like GBIF, iDigBio, Symbiota portals
- Scientific value of specimens Physical and digital accessibility has catered to the scientific community
- Reflected in our virtual herbarium. To find our specimens you have to know what you are looking for, and to understand scientific names
- Even though pages are open to everyone, accessibility to non-scientists is limited

History of Collections Access

- Garden is a public venue, missed opportunities to reach audiences that have an interest in natural history
- Visitors to the Garden see the beautiful grounds, but the herbarium and our science program are largely hidden
- Exhibition in 2017 What in the World is a Herbarium?
- Turning point to expand our public outreach
- Included specimens showcasing research and easily recognizable plants






Branching Out to the Public

- Held our first Open House to coincide with exhibition
- Opportunity for our staff to Branch Out and share specimen stories of interest to them
- Relatable to the public, to telling both scientific and cultural stories
- New perspective Scientific vouchers but also artifacts of human history
- Often timed on opening or closing weekends of the Garden's major exhibitions as well as staff meetings



The Humanities Institute, supported by The Mellon Foundation, promotes innovative thinking at the intersection of science and the humanities, particularly in the vital and growing field of Food Humanities. A division of Education, the Institute strengthens The New York Botanical Garden's academic role among universities and research centers worldwide. It engages a lively community of fellows and visiting scholars who study NYBG's historical collections in the Mertz Library, the Archives, and William and Lynda Steere Herbarium to further their interdisciplinary research projects. Lecture series, workshops, and symposia span issues in foodways, Food Studies, and justice, with special programs focused on the Bronx. While the borough is disproportionately impacted by food insecurity, it's also home to vibrant, multi-cultural food traditions, stories and community gardens that all come together in the *Bronx Foodways Oral Histories Project* – a partnership with NYBG's Bronx Green-Up, and leading community gardens and urban farms.



Spotlight: Exhibitions

- Garden wide exhibitions Supply specimens to display for length of exhibition (6 months)
 - Make specimens for display (UV light can damage permanent collection)
 - 3D specimens
 - Plant fiber fabric swatches
 - Swap real specimens to limit time in cases
 - Hand Lens stories related to exhibitions
 - Tabling

 - Rare Book Room






Spotlight: Social Media

- We now get requests to collaborate.






